
MATTHEW 13:1-23 OR 13:1-9

REFLECTION

All four of today's Scripture texts speak, in some way, to God's creation. Throughout all of these readings, creation serves as a powerful metaphor for the receiving of God's Word and responding to it. Taking the image of soil in receiving of God's Word, we learn that good soil produces good fruit while poor soil that is not well tended allows the seed to wither and die. The seed is always sown, but how it grows and flourishes depends on how it is received and nurtured once spread. When the word and soil unite together entirely and effectively, the result is abundance and brilliance of life.



On June 18, 2015, Pope Francis issued a papal encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, which focuses on the call to care for God's creation. Leading up to its publication, there was much debate surrounding the document. Some were thrilled that the pope was spending much effort and time examining the issue of climate change, while others were quite angered that he would do such a thing, arguing that the Church has no place in discussing such matters and should stay out of the realm of science. But the reality is that the earth and all who inhabit this planet are faced with a critical situation with regard to ecological realities. Go and read the encyclical itself.
