

THE HOUR OF GREAT MERCY

In His revelations to St. Faustina, Our Lord asked for a special prayer and meditation on His Passion each afternoon at the three o'clock hour, the hour that recalls His Death on the Cross.

At three o'clock, implore My Mercy, especially for sinners; and, if only for a brief moment, immerse yourself in My Passion, particularly in My abandonment at the moment of agony. This is the hour of great Mercy. In this hour, I will refuse nothing to the soul that makes a request of Me in virtue of My Passion (*Diary*, 1320).

As often as you hear the clock strike the third hour, immerse yourself completely in My Mercy, adoring and glorifying it; invoke its omnipotence for the whole world, and particularly for poor sinners; for at that moment Mercy was opened wide for every soul. In this hour you can obtain everything for yourself and for others for the asking; it was the hour of Grace for the whole world – Mercy triumphed over justice. (1572) My daughter, try your best to make the Stations of the Cross in this hour, provided that your duties permit it; and if you are not able to make the Stations of the Cross, then at least step into the Chapel for a moment and adore, in the Most Blessed Sacrament, My Heart, which is full of Mercy; and should you be unable to step into the Chapel, immerse yourself in prayer there where you happen to be, if only for a very brief instant. (1572)

From these detailed instructions, it's clear that Our Lord wants us to turn our attention to His Passion at the three o'clock hour to whatever degree our duties allow, and He wants us to ask for His Mercy.

In Genesis 18:16-32, Abraham begged God to reduce the conditions necessary for Him to be merciful to the people of Sodom and Gomorrah. Here, Christ Himself offers a reduction of conditions because of the varied demands of our life's duties, and He begs us to ask, even in the smallest way, for His Mercy, so that He will be able to pour His Mercy upon us all.

We may not be able to make the Stations or adore Him in the Blessed Sacrament, but we can all mentally pause for a "brief instant," think of His total abandonment at the hour of agony, and say a short prayer such as "Jesus, Mercy," or "Jesus, for the sake of Your Sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter in each of the Lectionary cycles. This fact alone should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the Resurrected Jesus that are described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to His Disciples after His Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the Disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that He appeared to His Disciples not as a spirit, but in bodily form. We do not know, however, exactly what this form looked like. Earlier in John's Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the Risen Jesus, she did not recognize Him until He spoke to her. In Luke's Gospel, the Disciples walking along the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until He broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in His Resurrected form, Jesus was not bound by matter; He appeared to the Disciples inside a home even though the door was locked. Yet the Disciples could still touch the marks of His Crucifixion. In today's Gospel, Jesus greets His Disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions His Disciples to continue the work that He has begun; as Jesus was sent by God, so Jesus sends His Disciples. He gives His Disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be able to accomplish this task. Jesus' words to His Disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. With the Grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share forgiveness and reconciliation with others.

Thomas, the doubting Disciple in today's reading, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first Disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, Who was Crucified and buried, appeared to His Disciples. Our human nature seeks hard evidence that the Jesus Who appeared to His Disciples after His Death is indeed the same Jesus Who was Crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative in obtaining this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus Who was raised is the same Jesus Who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe.

Liturgical Reflection Year of St. Joseph...150th Anniversary of Naming St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church - Joseph was warned in a dream that Herod sought to kill the Child. He fled with his family to Egypt. In Egypt "parents and Child remained until after Herod's death." (Mt 2:13; 19). One hundred and fifty years after Pope Pius IX named St. Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church, on December 8, 1870, Pope Francis noted the anniversary on December 8, 2020, by dedicating an entire year to the Saint. As Pius IX and the entire Church were undergoing great darkness in the world, all were entrusted to the providence of God in 1870 and St. Joseph. Moving forward to the 21st century, we look at how the Church is again endangered with persecution, troubled by sin and evil, and under attack for her sovereignty and pro-life stance. And who do we turn to?
