After an amazing inaugural year, we are excited to bring back the Sunday Market series back to Cambria City in 2021. This year we have renamed the Market Series, added an additional Sunday and moved the location to Emerich Place, 512 Chestnut St. These changes will allow the Sunday Markets to accommodate vendors and visitors in a larger area which is conducive to following pandemic related and gathering regulations in a more productive, safe and viable manner. Sundays are traditionally when family and friends gather to reconnect and share their lives with each other. The Sunday Markets have been the perfect time for this and we are already looking forward to another year of Sundays filled with great food, shopping, music, friendship and community.

Background on the Gospel Reading

On the Seventh Sunday of Easter, we always read from the seventeenth chapter of John's Gospel. This chapter of John's Gospel comes at the conclusion of Jesus' farewell discourse delivered to the Disciples at the Last Supper. This entire chapter is a prayer by Jesus, commending Himself to the Father and expressing His care and concern for His Disciples. At the end of this prayer, Jesus and His Disciples depart for the garden, and Jesus is arrested. Several important themes appear in this prayer. First, Jesus' prayer reaffirms the complete union between Himself and



the Father. Throughout John's Gospel, Jesus has been presented as the One Who preexisted with the Father and as the One sent by the Father to do His work on earth. In today's reading, we hear Jesus include all His Disciples in this union with the Father. We are reminded that Christ is the source of Christian unity. Through Christ, we are united with one another and with God our Father. In this prayer, Jesus describes part of His mission in the language of protection. He has protected those who were given to Him by the Father. In this we hear echoes of the dualism that is reflected throughout John's Gospel. Beginning with the opening chapter the Evangelist John has presented Jesus' mission on earth in the context of a cosmic struggle between good and evil, represented by light and darkness. In Jesus' presence, His Disciples have been protected from Satan. Now that Jesus is returning to the Father, He prays that His Disciples will continue to be protected from the evil one. We can't help but note here the echoes of the prayer that Jesus taught His Disciples, the Lord's Prayer.

We also see in this chapter the distinction found in John's Gospel between the world and the Disciples. The Disciples are in the world, but they do not belong to the world. Yet like Jesus, they are sent into the world for the world's salvation. As Jesus' teaching and ministry was a source of consternation for some, Jesus knows that the world may not accept His Disciples with open arms. Again, we hear echoes to John's theme that salvation is worked out through the cosmic battle between light and darkness. The world, according to John, prefers the darkness. Yet the light will not be overcome by the darkness. Reading this prayer of Jesus during the Easter Season, through the lens of His Resurrection, we know that the Light of Christ has overcome the darkness of sin and death in our world. In the opening line of this prayer, we hear Jesus pray that His Disciples will be kept in the name that He was given by God. We know that the salvation is given to us in the Name of Jesus, and that His Name – "God saves" – announces His mission on our behalf.

Families and the Gospel...May 16, 2021 – John 17:11-19 – Jesus was worried about His Disciples and He turned to prayer. No matter how much time we spent trying to "guard and protect" our children, each day they become less dependent on us and we must let go and let God. Prayer and parenting go together.

Prayer for the Canonization of Blessed Michael McGivney (Founder of the Knights of Columbus)

God, our Father, protector of the poor and defender of the widow and orphan, You called Your Priest, Blessed Michael McGivney, to be an apostle of Christian family life and to lead the young to the generous service of their neighbor. Through the example of his life and virtue, may we follow Your Son, Jesus Christ, more closely, fulfilling His commandment of charity and building up His Body which is the Church. Let the inspiration of Your servant prompt us to greater confidence in Your love so that we may continue his work of caring for the needy and the outcast. We humbly ask that You glorify Blessed Michael McGivney on earth according to the design of Your Holy Will. Through his intercession, grant the favor I now present (*make your request*). Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
