# Norms for the Distribution and Reception of Holy Communion under Both Kinds in the Diocese of United States of America

### **July 2, 2023** Thirteenth Sunday on Ordinary Time

The Second Vatican Council has urged that the more perfect form of participation in the Mass is that the faithful, after the priest's Communion, receive the Lord's Body from the same Sacrifice. As noted at the Council of Trent, the faithful present at each Mass, for the sake of a fuller participation in the holy Eucharist, should communicate not only by spiritual desire but also by sacramental reception of Communion. The Church strongly suggests Holy Communion given to God's people come from the altar of that Mass, and not from the reserved Sacrament in the tabernacle. Bread and wine consecrated at that Mass is ideally the Communion distributed to the faithful. C.f. **General Instruction of the Roman Missal**, 2011, Number 13.

## Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel is the conclusion of the instructions and consolations that we have heard Jesus offering to His Disciples during the past few weeks. In this passage, Jesus summarizes both the costs of discipleship and its rewards. Once again our understanding of the Gospel is strengthened by considering the context in which it was written and the perspective of Matthew's audience.

The conditions of discipleship outlined in Matthew's Gospel may appear harsh. Yet they underline for us a truth—choosing anything with one's whole heart has consequences. Choosing life with Christ means that every relationship we have must be understood from a new perspective. For many in Matthew's community, this choice brought division to their family.

Matthew also outlines the reward of hospitality offered to Jesus' followers. In today's Gospel, Jesus explains the difficulties of discipleship, yet reveals that those who welcome the Disciples have also welcomed Him.

Today's Gospel also highlights for us the importance of hospitality in the Christian life. To welcome another in Jesus' Name is to extend hospitality to Jesus Himself. We have many opportunities in our daily life to reach out to others, to be a welcoming presence and a sign of God's love.

We are reminded of the necessity and how the power of hospitality through our Baptism is what makes us Disciples and Christian stewards in the first place. Christ teaches us how to live daily life as His Stewards. We must live for Christ! Nothing less will do.

We put God first by serving others as if we were serving Christ Himself, thus losing a self-centered life. "Whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink is a disciple..." It is precisely our loving actions towards others, loving them as if they were Christ, that we demonstrate our love for Christ! (www.CatholicSteward.com, 6/11/2020)
