## Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel passage is the conclusion of Jesus' discourse with His Disciples. It is about the end of time, the coming of the Son of Man, and the Final Judgement. We hear this description of the Final Judgement at the conclusion of our Liturgical Year, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ the King. In the context of Matthew's Gospel, this passage might also be read as a conclusion of Matthew's report on Jesus' Life and Ministry; the remaining chapters report the events of Jesus' Passion and Resurrection.

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes to His Disciples the scene of the judgement of the Son of Man. All the nations will be assembled before Him, and He will separate them as a shepherd separates sheep and goats upon their return from the pasture. The judgements made by the Son of Man will be based upon the acts of mercy shown to the least ones—the hungry, the thirsty, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. Indeed, Jesus, Who suffered on the Cross, identifies Himself with the least ones.

Recall that last week's parable of the talents taught us that the gifts that we have been given are intended to be used for the service of others, especially the least among us. Our judgement before God will be based not only on how we have used these gifts and talents, but also on how we have extended ourselves in service to these least ones. Indeed, Jesus tells us that whenever we have served these least ones, we have served Christ Himself.

When we read today's Gospel in the context of the chapters that follow in Matthew's Gospel, we learn the extent to which Jesus identifies with the least ones. In accepting Death on the Cross, Jesus shows Himself to be one of the hungry, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. To accept Jesus is to accept Him Who Suffered and Died on the Cross as one of the least ones.

### NOVEMBER 26, 2023 - CHRIST THE KING SOLEMNITY

Today we come to the end of the liturgical year, celebrating the magnificent feast of the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Our readings provide contrasting images of our King – He has authority over all, and yet, He is humble and tender in His care for us, especially the most vulnerable. How can we properly honor and love such a King? By offering Him our very lives through the stewardship way of life. What is it that He expects from us? The Gospel passage from Matthew shows us. The passage begins with Christ's own descriptions of His Second Coming, "When the Son of Man comes in His glory and all the angels with Him, He will sit upon His glorious throne, and all the nations will be assembled before Him." Then the moment of judgement will come. Some will be invited into the Kingdom of Heaven, others sent to eternal punishment. This judgement will be based not on how influential we became in society, how high we climbed the corporate ladder, nor any worldly achievements. Rather our judgement will be based on how we treated the last of those around us.

The more deeply we embrace the stewardship way of life, the more closely our priorities will align with His. This way of life prepares us well for our judgement day and helps us to live in imitation of our King.
